Carolyn Rich Curtis, PhD,
Healthy Marriage Project

MATT P. introduced Carolyn Rich Curtis, PHD a Psychology Instructor at American River College and who has spent 32 years as a marriage and family counselor. Carolyn founded Sacramento Healthy Marriage Project five years ago to help couples stay happily married and form healthy families. She says she owes her success to support from Rotary. She got a donation from a Rotarian which made a federal start up grant possible.

Sacramento County has a higher than usual divorce rate. 9,000 children are born to unwed parents each year. This means 1/3 of our children are born to unwed parents. In the Hispanic com-

ty 46% of Hispanic families and 70% of African American families children are born to unwed parents. It takes a family to build emotional security in a child. 60% of couples nation wide stay married but only 24% of those are really happy.

Mothers and fathers have vastly different play styles. Emotional control in children comes from their relationships with their father. The marshmallow test measures self control. Those children who can delay gratification and delay eating a marshmallow eventually becomes a 125 point advantage on the SAT's (Children are told to sit and look at a marshmallow for a certain amount of time and if they do so they will receive two marshmallows.)

Some communities have reduced the divorce rate 50-89%. When parents actually get along children thrive. The Healthy Marriage Project is trying to get marriage education program and relationship skills training in the community, beginning with high school students, on how to build and end relationships. The "hook up" culture is dangerous. Multiple partners lead to diminished ability for intimacy with a life partner.

They sponsor programs with churches, mosques and temples, and offer classes for financially poor couples and parents on how to build

healthy families.

Their vision and dream is that every child grows up in an emotionally healthy home.

60% of divorces are from low conflict homes, which really damage children with insecurities about marriage. Children who are raised in high conflict homes are damaged by witnessing the yelling and screaming between the parents. They are re leaved when their parents are divorced, but the damage is already done. In studies following couples that are going through difficult times found that five years later those who got divorced were no happier than those who did not. Married couples normally go through hard times. More time and effort needs to go into building healthy relationships. Research shows that couples who "live together" without a commitment before marriage have a much higher failure rate.



Arranged marriages have a much higher happiness quotient than marriage in our instant-and-permanent-gratification culture.
