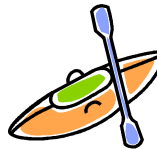
Introductions:

Uganda, by Steve Dolan

MATT P. Introduced Steve Dolan son of JIM and Ann D.

Steve has been teaching at Granite Bay high school for 13 years. He teaches Design and Engineering courses and runs the ROP internship program. He currently is serving as Site Technology coordinator and has been selected to be part of the site leadership team.

Steve has had the opportunity to travel to Uganda 3 times in the past 18 months. He is working with Christian Life



Orphanage in Seeta Uganda which is home to 800 orphans and 100 widows. He is a construction lead, supervising the installation of a water purification system and an electrical system. He is serving on the Board of Directors for Operation Ignite. This is a marketing and fundraising organization with the goal of sending Sacramento area residents on humanitarian, medical, and faith based mission trips throughout the world.

He has been married to his wife Cyndi for 13 years. They have 2 sons and a daughter who are all in school at Greenhills.

Steve started his program by asking us what we knew about Uganda. Several remembered that Israel rescued about 140 hostages being held there by terrorists at about the time of our bicentennial in 1976.

Some research says AIDS originated in Uganda in the 1970's but Uganda now has the lowest rate at 4%. Children in Northern Uganda are forced to become soldiers, at an average age of 11. Uganda is now very stable in the south, but they have many needs, including 10% of the world's

orphans (due to the AIDS epidemic). The weather is much like San Diego. English is the national language. School is quite rigorous for children. Their goal is to speak fluent English. Goat is the #1 meat. Potable water is a challenge; drink only bottled water if you go there.

A water filter was recently installed and has solved numerous health problems for the children. The electricity is 220v but spikes frequently to 300v and stays there for some time. They have a medical clinic now and eat well. They are well financed by U.S. resources. They advertise for children in need. The country is very unorganized and there is much squalor.

Their #1 request is for business and commerce to come from the U.S. Steve's group plans to build a trade school.

Cell phone service is very good. Roads are poor. Sponsorship of a child is \$30 per month. The

people are very welcoming. Uganda is almost 80% Christian but there is no Muslim-Christian tension. There is a Rotary Club there which does micro-loans. Polygamy is accepted there. Steve will be selling on Ebay attractive, colorful jewelry he brought back, made from compressed trash. The proceeds will benefit the orphanage.

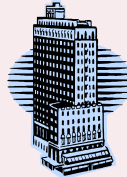

Update, Northern Argentina



With winter vacation, I finally had time to travel north of where I live. Gorgeous scenery, really breathtaking. Now I know why so many travelers make the effort to visit. I'll start from the top left- that's the famous "cerro de 7 colores" or 7 colored mountains. The minerals in the earth give the mountains the rainbow colored swirl. The photo was taken in Purmamarca, a tiny pueblito tucked away in this beautiful backdrop. Next are rocks from the Garganta Del Diablo. If you are a savvy reader with a good memory, that might ring a bell. There is also a Garganta Del Diablo en Iguazu falls. Apparently the name gets used again and again to explain places with such majestic heights - we found yet a third Garganta in Cafayate, another place we visited. We did a good hike and rock climb to get to the bottom of the rocks, the best view of the Garganta. The next photo was taken during a drive from Purmamarca to the Salinas Grandes, the last two photos. The Salinas are salt flats - yes all of that white is salt, not snow! It pops up out of the earth in that pattern. It's crazy, salt for miles, or kilometers is perhaps more appropriate.
