Four Avenues of Service

1 Club Service focuses on strengthening fellowship and ensuring the effective functioning of the club.

2 Vocational Service encourages Rotarians to serve others through their vocations and to practice high ethical standards.

3 Community Service covers the projects and activities the club undertakes to improve life in its community.

4 International Service encompasses actions taken to expand Rotary's humanitarian reach around the globe and to promote world understanding and peace.

The Object of Rotary

To encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular to encourage and foster:

FIRST: The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND: High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying by each Rotarian of his/her occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD: The application of the ideal of service by every Rotarian to his personal, business and community life.

FOURTH: The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional men and women united in the ideal of service.

Program:

National Health Care Reform Policy and Preferred Solutions

PATRICIA M. introduced Shannon Zajec, an Employee Benefits Broker/Consultant with Barclay West.

Candidate Obama, one year ago, said in debates he wanted health care for all Americans and to tame rising health care costs. There are 47 million uninsured people in this country, which includes illegal aliens, some who choose not to buy insurance but make over \$50,000/year (18 million) and some who don't bother to apply. Of 262 million insured, 160 million are in group plans, 12 million in individual plans, 45 million in Medicare and 45 million in Medicaid. The approximately 1/3 in government programs cost approximately 1/2 of all health care costs.

Who really pays the bill for health care? Current government plans of Medicare and Medicaid are underfunded \$49 billion and \$40 billion annually. Private plans carry the \$89 billion deficit as a "cost shift."

The proposed government health care reform policies are:

- Guarantee issue of individual plans - which will cause people to wait until illness comes to get insured.
- Coverage mandates on individuals and employers or pay a penalty. (Massachusetts has this, but rates are higher there than California and are increasing exponentially.)
- Government designed insurance plan (public option, which means eventually everyone will be insured by the government).
- Cuts in Medicare Advantage.
- New taxes, on "Cadillac" Plans or higher incomes (Cadillac Plans are not defined.)
- There will be 30 more agencies, bureaus and government programs. (Wow, there's a cost saving! Ed.)
- Managed competition (which means government will control everything.)
- Expansion of Medicaid.
- Subsidies for middle class, if earning less than \$80,000 per year for a family.
- Eventually, rationing of health care.

Shannon had everyone hold up their cell phones and compare the deals available when there is competition.

Preferred solutions:

- Insurance choice, with choices of what to

- Tax benefits for individual health insurance and costs.
- Nationwide market for insurance products.
- High ceilings for HSA (health savings account) plans (pre-tax slush fund to cover health expenses.)
- Price transparency for health services.
- Health status insurance - a premium for locking you in to insurance coverage if you get a major illness, because it provides resources to cover really high premiums for insurance for major illnesses.
- Tort reform, which already exists in California.
- Non-physician competition (advice nurses).
- Approval of new products - patent reform.
- CHIP registration for children.
- Allow Medicare and Medicaid to compete (with vouchers).

Safeway's plan is going down in cost each year. The employer pays the first \$1,000 each year; then the employee pays the next \$1,000; then it's 80/20 after that. Employees are very careful to keep their health care costs within the first \$1,000 paid by the employer. Health care costs are not high because of insurance; insurance costs are high because of rising health care costs. Health care costs arise largely from unhealthy lifestyles.
